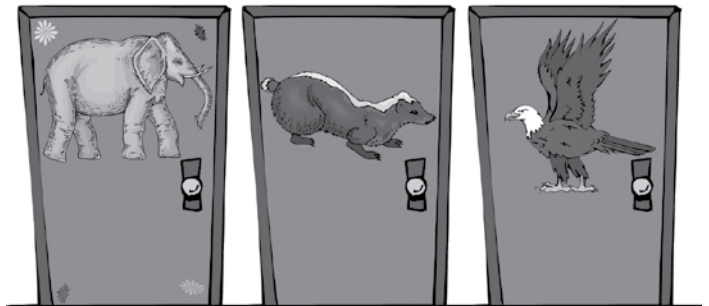
12A Introduction

ancient

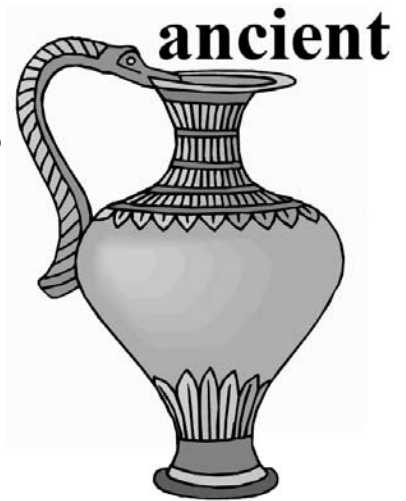
(adj). Very old. *The Egyptian vase was **ancient**; it was more than 2,000 years old.*

approach

(verb). To come near to. *The deer **approached** Kele slowly.*

contain

(verb). To hold, or have within. *The pizza box contained a warm pepperoni pizza. Related word: **container**. **(noun)** A jar, box, can or bottle that can hold something else inside. *Bo was messy until he found a **container** for his pens.**



elegant

(adj). Showing beauty and nice taste. *My mother loves to wear **elegant** dresses when she goes out on Friday nights.*

enable

(verb). To make something possible. *Growing two inches this summer **enabled** me to go on the pirate ship ride at the fair.*

observe

(verb). To see, or to watch closely. *On my trip to Africa, I was able to **observe** lions in their natural home.*

recall

(verb). To remember. *By reading my diary, I can **recall** what I did a year ago.*

symbol

(noun). Something that stands for or represents something else. *The 50 stars on the American flag are **symbols** for the 50 states.*

theory

(noun). An idea that explains something, but may or may not be right. *I have a **theory** about why dogs and humans get along so well: They both love to smile.*

woe

(noun). Intense sadness. *Sandro had never experienced any real **woe** until his pet goldfish got sick.*

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The Great Pyramids

Cairo, a city in Egypt, may be a very modern city. But just down the road in Giza, about 40 miles away, are some of the most **ancient** buildings in the world: the pyramids. Although they were built over 4,000 years ago, six pyramids are still standing. But what's most interesting is actually what's inside of these buildings.

Long ago, Egyptians believed that when a king died, he would become one of the gods. But they believed that the king's dead body must be protected. So they made the dead king into a mummy by wrapping his entire body in strips of cloth.

Egyptians built pyramids as burial places for their kings so that they would be ready for the next life. Inside the pyramids are little rooms that **contained** the mummies. They filled the rooms with food, jewels and anything else they thought the king would need in the next life. Egyptians also painted **symbols**, called hieroglyphics, all over the walls. These symbols were actually prayers that the king would have a safe journey into the next life.

There is a lot about the pyramids that we still don't know. For example, we are not sure how



the pyramids were actually built. One **theory** is that the Egyptians built a giant ramp, then pushed or pulled the huge stones up to the top. Another idea is that the builders used ropes and animals to carry the heavy stones. One thing is for sure—it is amazing that the pyramids were built without any machines!

If you want to get a good look at the pyramids, there are tours that take visitors around and even inside some of them. But you can't **approach** them by car or bus. The pollution from nearby cities and cars has worn away some of the rock of the pyramids. If you really want to see them up close, you have to ride a camel!

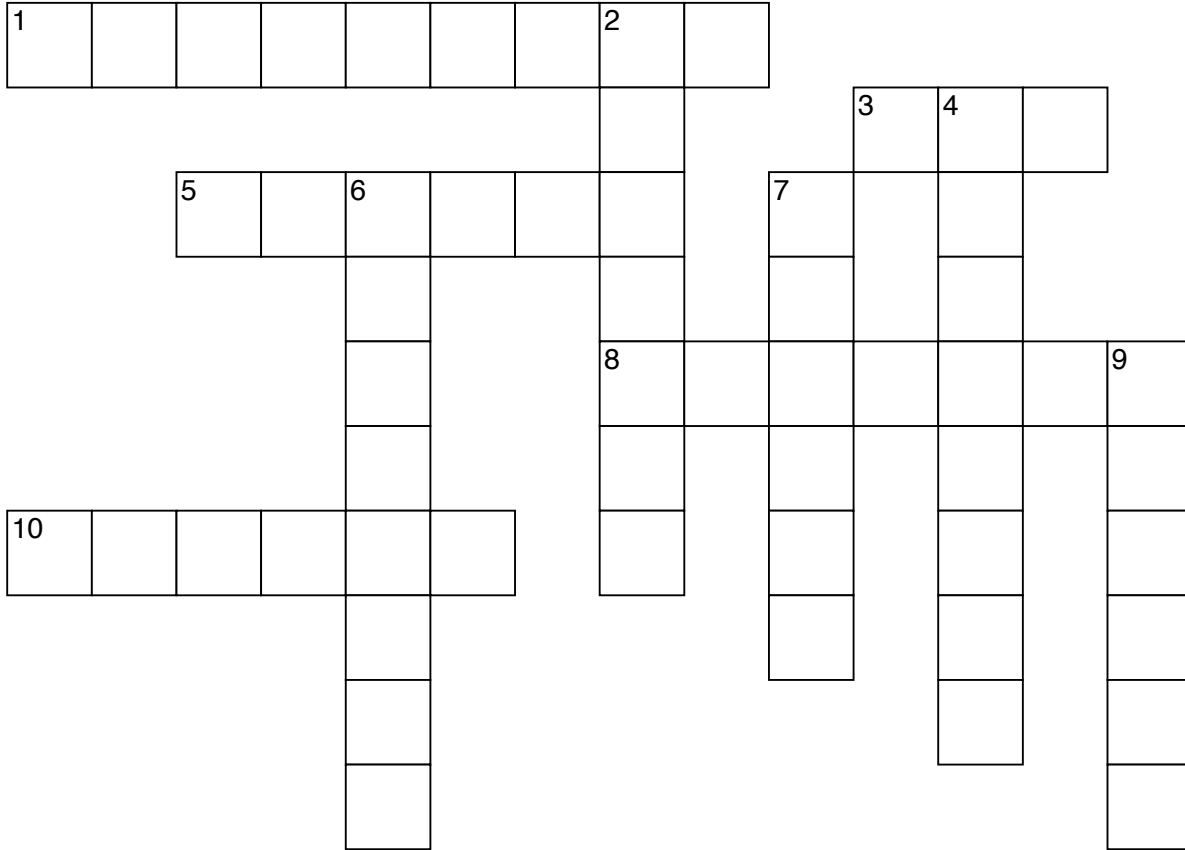
